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Leadership University THEO 101 – Intro Systematic Theology

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will teach students how to study what the Bible teaches us today on any given topic. Students will learn to establish clear biblical basis by studying specific topics within scripture and personally applying these topics to their lives. Students will study the doctrine of the Word of God, the doctrine of God, and the doctrine on man.
